FACULTY PROFILE:

MARY ELLEN RYAN, ELEMENTARY SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Mary Ellen Ryan's mother, Ellen, knew very early on that her daughter was destined to be a teacher. She could see it as Mary Ellen played with her dolls, or more specifically, as she taught her dolls. Mary Ellen knew it early on as well and started tutoring elementary school students when she was only in Grade 7.

Her passion for education meant an obvious career path, and Mary Ellen, who grew up in Prospect, Nova Scotia, started at Mount Saint Vincent University in 1983 and from there received an integrated Bachelor of Arts and Education Degree. As part of that degree, Mary Ellen's last student placement was here, at Sacred Heart, thanks to some divine intervention from the head of the program, Sr. Agnes Paula. At the end of her placement, Mary Ellen was offered a full-time teaching position by then Principal Joan Dorrington and started as a homeroom teacher in Elementary School.

It was the beginning of a 30-plus-year educational career that still has her as motivated and passionate as when she started. As her early career evolved here, Mary Ellen moved from homeroom teaching to starting the first computer lab and teaching both students and colleagues about the role of IT in education, something that was not so common back then but an area she knew was poised for big growth. She continued to teach as she and her husband David started their family which eventually included two boys, Thomas and Jeremy, who attended Sacred Heart in their early years.

In 2003, then Headmistress Patricia Donnelly suggested Mary Ellen look into the Gifted Education conference at the University of Connecticut (UConn), which she did that very summer when she embarked on a two-week intensive immersion into the program. It instantly clicked and Mary Ellen fell in love with what would become the rest of her life's work. She went on to study at UConn for her master's degree and continued going back for many years after that to continue her education.

Now that the flame was lit, Mary Ellen knew she needed to practice in this specialized area. With very few options available in Canada, she learned about the International Schools Program, and in 2003 chose a three-year placement in Colorado at Flynn Elementary School where she started the Gifted Magnet Program. In her first year, she was recognized as the Teacher of the Year in her school district, validating her new direction. During her three-year term at Flynn, she expanded the program and was well on her way to becoming a specialist in gifted education.



At the end of that short term, she and her family decided another move was in the cards. Adventurers at heart (Mary Ellen has visited 22 countries and counting), they decided to head overseas. In 2006, she started at the Hong Kong International School, one of the top schools in Eastern Asia. It was a whole new world, both culturally and scholastically.

The school was huge, with over 2,600 students. She started as the Specialist Coordinator for Gifted Education. Not long after though, she changed the name of the program and started using the term enrichment rather than gifted, something that was strongly intuitive for her as it better matched her philosophy that education should be inclusive rather than elitist. For her, enrichment was more about a school-wide effort including both students and teachers and allowed all students to find their gifts and talents and to capitalize on them for a deeper educational experience. That experience allowed students to own their learning and to find their voice as they made choices about their educational interests and direction.

Mary Ellen dove deep into this area, immersing herself in the world of enrichment. So much so that she was invited to speak about it throughout East Asia. At the school, she expanded the program, started teaching the teachers, and eventually moved on to become an instructional coach with a particular emphasis on mathematics.

In 2017, Mary Ellen turned her attention to her continuing education journey as she started studying to earn her Principal's certification in International School Leadership through an online program in Ontario. It was a challenging time. Her husband had just passed away and she continued to work full-time, but this deep dive into a new realm of the educational world was both a distraction and the beginning of a new trajectory.





She completed her certification two years later and during that journey, she also found happiness again with her new husband, Kevin.

But sometimes fate throws a wrench into plans, even if that wrench turns out to be a blessing in disguise. In late March of 2024, Mary Ellen got a call that her mother who was still in Prospect, Nova Scotia had taken ill. Mary Ellen came home to see her and after a short visit, returned to Hong Kong only to be told she immediately needed to go back. Her mother passed away shortly thereafter. One day later, Mary Ellen got a call from her cousin and long-time Senior School Counsellor Carolyn MacKenzie, to let her know that the Elementary School Principal role at Sacred Heart would be open for the coming school year. As has happened many times in Mary Ellen's life, fate intervened — it was the only role in the world she was interested in for her last move within the field of education.

Mary Ellen interviewed for the role and quickly distinguished herself with Head of School, Dennis Phillips and the search committee, and she was offered the job. Fairly quickly, given their life was a world away, she and Kevin packed up and moved back to Nova Scotia. Mary Ellen returned home to Prospect where she grew up and came home to Sacred Heart where she first started her educational career and where she plans to end it.

With her, she brings an insatiable desire to provide an exceptional education to young students. She is also introducing enrichment and differentiated programming to the Elementary School to increase the School's educational discernment practices and elevate the learning experience for our youngest students.

As Mary Ellen settles into her second term at Sacred Heart, she is discovering some things have changed and some important things haven't — the loving, supportive environment within this community and the dedication and talent of the faculty.

We are thrilled to have Mary Ellen back at the Heart and look forward to the many contributions we know she will make. Welcome home!

Undaunted, Elisabeth applied and after a six-month process that included written applications, language skill testing, and face-to-face interviews, Elisabeth was accepted into the program. Once she was accepted into the University of Ottawa in the Honors Bachelor of Science program, she was set.

Elisabeth started at UofO and the Page Program in early September 2024 and hasn't looked back. She's been on the floor of the House of Commons for a very eventful year that has included three votes of non-confidence, the resignation of our current Prime Minister, and the introduction of Canadian Olympians. And while it means some very long and intense days balancing the role and her school work, she is loving the experience. She has met some fascinating people and has had the privilege of seeing the behind-the-scenes and inner workings of our parliamentary democracy.

Although Elisabeth is intent on a law career, she acknowledges there may be an avenue where politics could be incorporated. In the meantime, she looks forward to the rest of her one-year term. We look forward to seeing where this interesting journey will ultimately take Elisabeth.
